Questions and Answers

Q. What do I do if I'm interested in having my child come to Wood Creek for the PYP IB programme?

A. If your children is in the Wood Creek attendance area they are part of the IB as they are enrolled. If you live outside of the Wood Creek attendance area, you can contact Wood Creek's office to inquire about the process.

Q. Why is IB for my child?

A. Our International Baccalaureate educators are specially trained to develop a child's natural curiosity. Teaching children to be successful inquirers means that they get to be actively involved in how they learn, rather than passive participants. Our students have Spanish instruction two times a week. This class works on oral and written expression and cultural understanding.

Q. What does it mean to be internationally-minded?

A. We believe that being internationally-minded is to take action through discussion and collaboration to help us build a better world. We use the IB Learner Profile to help all learners to be kind, respectful, and action-oriented citizens.

Q. What does an inquiry-based education look like?

A. An inquiry-based, concept driven education focuses on the learner.

Our International Baccalaureate educators focus on student questions and support their learning in exploring those answers. Our belief is that students become active, compassionate, and lifelong learners through open communication and discourse with the teacher.



Curriculum

The PYP IB curriculum is expressed as three interrelated components: the written, the taught, and the assessed curriculums. At the heart of the curriculum is the learner constructing meaning and being the inquirer. Wood Creek staff has used the PYP Transdisciplinary Themes (6 themes) to organize their curriculum for inquiry. They have organized it in an IB Programme of Inquiry:

- Who we are
- How we express ourselves
- How we organize ourselves
- Where we are in place and time
- How the world works
- Sharing the planet
